Random Sample of Submissions Received on the Eighth Amendment of the Constitution

A submissions process was open to the public from the 14 October 2016 to 16 December 2016.

The Assembly received in excess of 13, 500 submissions, online and by post.

To assist members in digesting the submissions, the secretariat has compiled a random sample of 300 submissions. A note on the methodology is provided below.

This random sample produced 185 online submissions and 115 postal submissions and these are presented in that order below.

These submissions will be discussed by the Members at the Assembly meeting on 4th February.

Members should ideally read each of these submissions in advance of the meeting. However, if this is not possible you are asked to dip in an out of the document, to read from both the online and postal submissions.

Random Sample Selection Methodology

- Each individual submission was given a unique alpha numeric identifier. This allowed each record to be individually identified and retrieved once the random selection had taken place.
- No categorisation or filtering was done in advance
- A formula was applied using a random number generator in excel and a sample of 300 submissions was selected.
- It is noted that this sample may include some level of duplication, due to the large number of campaign or repeat submissions received. However in order to be as transparent as possible the sample, once selected, was not altered in any way.
- The 300 randomly selected submissions was then compiled into a single document, grouped according to how they were received (all electronic submissions together, all postal submissions together).

Since the foundation of the State, the Republic and our citizens has chosen to accept and respect that fundamental human rights apply to all human beings, regardless of status, race, creed, gender, ability, stage of development, environment or state of dependency.

The first five categories mentioned above are self-explanatory, however, the last three categories are not often quoted, please allow me to explain briefly:

- 1. Stage of development: Human beings' fundamental right to life exists as much for a newborn (early stage of development) as for a 35year old mature adult. The same applies for a fetus in very early stage of development.
- 2. Environment: Human beings' fundamental rights applies as much to members of an undiscovered tribe in the Amazon jungle as for someone living in a penthouse apartment in Dublin 2. The same applies to human beings in the environment of their mothers' womb.
- 3. Dependency: Whether a bed-ridden individual dependent on caring relatives, a breastfed baby dependent on mother's milk or a fetus fully dependent on mother's womb, all human rights apply equally to each individual person.

The fundamental question, the one question that truly matters, the REAL question that you as a member or the Citizen's Assembly are called on to decide is:

WHAT IS THE UNBORN?

That is the action that creates a specific individual - directing his/her own development, owning his/her own unique DNA sequences - the unique and continuous individual that we all once were, presently is, and continues to be somewhere along the continuum of human life from unborn stage to eventual death. Clearly unborn babies are humans and clearly, fundamental human rights, including the right to life, applies to the unborn as much as to you and me.

I believe that murder is wrong. This is the fifth commandment 'Thou shalt not kill'. I believe that all life is sacred, from the moment of conception, when biologically a new human being has formed. This human being is the most vulnerable form of human life. As responsible

human beings, we must do everything in our power to protect all human life, especially at its most vulnerable stages, whether early on or later on.

I have been strongly influenced in my life by the errors of the Nazi regime in Germany in the Second World War. I have often asked myself if I would have been strong enough to resist the murder, abuse and inhuman suffering imposed on Jewish and other vulnerable human beings.

The numbers of abortions per annum in the world are astounding. Worldwide, this year, there have been more than 38 million; since 1980, worldwide, there have been more than 1.3 billion - more than the population of India. This is a new holocaust. Even if one does not accept that the unborn child is a human being, imagine for a moment that one is wrong - then, isn't this truly a holocaust of unimaginable proportions. Surely, no 'human right' is worth this level of destruction of an individual human life-form, which must have some rights.

Of course it makes sense that in a mother or child situation, the mother's life must be prioritised. My wife is a medical doctor, a paediatrician. I know that doctors always do this. The practice is simply that the child is delivered prematurely (which often happens anyway, even if the mother's life is not under threat) and if the child fails to survive, despite the best efforts of doctors (who have sworn an oath, and who are obligated professionally, to protect all life, not just the less vulnerable, the privileged, the born, the ones who can speak out for themselves), then nature has taken its course - this is similar to a miscarriage or still-birth, whoc unfortunately are still quite common and very upsetting for would-be parents.

People argue that in cases of rape or so-called fatal foetal abnormality, then the would-be mother has the right to abort her unborn child. But two wrongs don't make a right. Life is full of risks. One doesn't get to choose to only have perfect babies - this is the wonderful joy of life. Children with Down's syndrome, though apparently imperfect, bring great joy to their parents. Sure, when we only in materialistic and superficial terms, this does not seem like an attractive option, but the easy road is rarely the better road to travel.

In short, I strongly believe that the Eight Amendment is a critical piece of legislation, which protects human life in Ireland, at its most critical stages.

If there is a referendum on the Eight Amendment, one option must be to leave the wording as it is, so that those who do not want direct procured abortion in this country, can vote to keep the Eight. CONCLUSION

In fact, as top medical experts testified to the Oireachtas in 2013, no woman has ever died in Ireland because of our pro-life laws. Our maternal mortality rate remains one of the lowest in the world.

Abortion also hurts women. A 2008 study (Fergusson et al) found that post-abortive women are 30% more likely to experience serious mental health problems while a 2006 study (Gissler et al) found that the suicide rate for post-abortive women was six times higher than women who had given birth.

Abortion is does not only have negative effects on women but it is also a cruel and inhumane practice towards the unborn. These children are dismembered and removed piece by piece or given a lethal injection directly into their hearts. This practice is both medieval and barbaric.

Because of our law, the equal right to life of babies with disabilities and severe life limiting conditions are guaranteed the same protections as every other child. While abortion activists treat these children as if they were already dead, the fact is that most babies, even the most severe cases, live after birth and their families find their time together enormously healing. "The current constitutional position is that both the right to life of the mother and [that of] the unborn are protected and that the former prevails wherever continuation of the pregnancy poses a real and substantial risk to the mother's life" (Gerry White). Those who wish to repeal the Eighth Amendment want to diminish the protection currently guaranteed in the case of the life of the unborn. Actually Gerry White) has also said: "The most obvious interpretation of any decision to delete article 40.3.3 is that the people will have decided to completely withdraw constitutional protection from the unborn. In this situation, the only constitutional factor at play will be the constitutional rights of the mother and clearly these would support a much more liberal regime of abortion".

The right to life is primordial; without it all other rights are without meaning. History provides us with plenty of examples of the disasters arising where one category of human being (in this case the born) exercise powers of life and death over another category of human being (in this case the unborn). Such cases always involve the anti-principle "Might is right". It is no surprise therefore that the preamble to the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child states: "the child by reason of his physical and mental immaturity, needs special safeguards and care, including appropriate legal protection, before as well as after birth". It is certainly sobering to recall that in the UK 90% of the unborn diagnosed with Down Syndrome in the womb are aborted. No category of human beings should be marginalised by law. We also know of course that abortion is practised even in countries of the West to effect gender discrimination — in this case, lethal discrimination — against the female unborn. It may be objected that liberalised abortion in Ireland would be restrictive, if that were legally possible. One should recall however that many of those calling for repeal of the Amendment point to UK abortion law as the exemplar to be followed. Abortion is legal in

Britain unfortunately for any detectable disability through all nine months of pregnancy, and 98% of abortions there are performed, not for health but for social reasons.

It would be preferable if the Amendment were retained. If however the campaign to hold a referendum succeeds in its aim, then there should be an honest and comprehensive public debate beforehand so that people can make an informed decision as to what a liberalised abortion regime might involve, if the Amendment were to be repealed. The public should be fully informed – preferably by means of short TV films, screened of course after the evening threshold – about the various methods of abortion, at different stages of gestation. Would the proposal be to allow abortion in some (as in the UK and in certain States of the US e.g.) or in all cases, up to the day of delivery? The Citizens' Assembly has been asked to consider a referendum to repeal the 8th amendment to the Constitution. As an Irish citizen who believes in the value of every human life from the moment of conception, this matter causes me great concern.

The 8th amendment guarantees the equal right to life of both women and their unborn children. The 8th was approved by the people in 1983 and since that time, has saved an estimated 250,000 lives. Our abortion rate has remained much lower than that of countries with legalised abortion. For a matter of fact Irish abortion rates have dropped considerably in the past decade.

UK 1968, the first year after abortion was legalized, there were 25,000 abortions, 2014 UK abortion rates were 201,500. However in the US 1980 25 per 1,000 women aged 15-44 years ended their pregnancies with abortion, in recent times due to abortion restrictions at state level and substandard services by Kermit Gosnell, Douglas Karper et al in 2013 12 per 1,000 aged 15-44 years chose abortion. This clearly indicates legitimizing a practice leads to an increase in demand

The 8th amendment ensures the protection of the most basic human rights. Science tells us that preborn babies are human beings and deserving of the protection of society. Every abortion ends a human life.

The 8th amendment protects the lives of pregnant mothers (including my sister who suffers with uncontrolled epilepsy) and allows our doctors to provide all necessary treatments and life-saving care to mothers experiencing medical emergencies during pregnancy. In fact, as

top medical experts testified to the Oireachtas in 2013, no woman has ever died in Ireland because of our pro-life laws. Our maternal mortality rate remains one of the lowest in the world.

Abortion also hurts women. A 2008 study (Fergusson et al) found that post-abortive women are 30% more likely to experience serious mental health problems while a 2006 study (Gissler et al) found that the suicide rate for post-abortive women was six times higher than women who had given birth.

Please find attached³ the Green Party's submission to the assembly. It sets out our policy, which calls for an immediate referendum to repeal the Eighth Amendment of the Irish Constitution and also outlines the legislation that we would enact following that action. We submit this to the assembly in order to assist you in your deliberation on bringing forth a referendum. We would also like to highlight the importance of supporting those who wish to act as legislators in the Oireachtas in devising a clear plan for what happens if that referendum is successful and a legal framework is required following the repeal of the Eighth Amendment.

You have been entrusted with a very important duty and we commend your dedication to the task you have been set and the seriousness and respect with which you are treating this process. . We have observed the proceedings through media coverage and the attendance of our representative Oliver Moran at the second meeting as an observer.

While we support the assembly in your efforts we would like you to note that your time and effort in this capacity is required only due to the failure or unwillingness of members of the Oireachtas to act on this matter. We expect and hope that we are not the only political party or group of Oireachtas members who have submitted policy documents or some form of vision for the future to this assembly. We believe that it is the duty of our legislative bodies to respond to civic and moral issues within society and as such this current process represents a failure within the political system.

There are many expert groups who have written briefings and model legislation for the use of legislators. All of the information that you are being provided with is already available to Oireachtas members and has been for a very long time. You may deem it appropriate to suggest legislation or some form of model for lawful termination of pregnancies in Ireland if the Eight Amendment is repealed. However, no further legislative action may be taken until the Eighth Amendment is submitted to the people of Ireland in the form of a referendum.

The Green Party asks that you recommend for the immediate calling of a referendum in order that this conversation be opened up to your fellow citizens. The Citizens Assembly has been asked to consider a referendum to repeal the right to life of the unborn child as protected under the 8th amendment to the Constitution. As an Irish citizen who strongly believes in the value of every human life, this prospect causes me great concern.

The 8th Amendment guarantees the equal right to life of both women and their unborn children. It ensures the protection of the most basic human rights. Science tells us that preborn babies are human beings and therefore deserve the same protection that all humans enjoy. At 21 days gestation, our hearts are already beating. Every abortion ends a human life. Top medical experts testified to the Oireachtas in 2013 that no woman has ever died in Ireland because of our prolife laws. Our maternity mortality rates remain the lowest in the world. A 2008 study (Ferguson et al) found that post-abortive women are 30% more likely to experience serious mental health problems, while a 2006 study (Gissler et al) found that the suicide rate for post-abortive women was six times higher than women who had given birth. Abortred children are dismembered and removed piece by piece or given a lethal injection directly into their hearts. This practice is both medieval and barbaric.

Because of our law, babies with disabilities and severe life-limiting conditions are guaranteed the same protection as every other child. As a student doctor coming to the end of my training, who also has a degree and MSc in psychology, I strongly believe that attributing rights to a collection of cells that may have the potential for life, the same rights we give to living, breathing, existing humans, is practically and morally wrong, as well as being psychologically damaging to women.

The formation of a human embryo is an incredible thing (please do look it up if you never have) but it is so complex and miraculous that it is often imperfect. The list of possible complications is far too long to go into here but until 3-4 months gestation, the embryo cannot be perceived as anything beyond a potential for life. The human body itself is well aware of these potential abnormalities and when it detects something wrong, something that makes these cells incompatible with life, will often undergo spontaneous abortion - usually known as a miscarriage. This list also includes a number of horrendous abnormalities the mean that if the potential foetus does progress, its short survival outside the uterus will be painful, laboured and short.

Dear Members of the Citizens' Assembly

Since the foundation of the State, the Republic and our citizens has chosen to accept and respect that fundamental human rights apply to all human beings, regardless of status, race, creed, gender, ability, stage of development, environment or state of dependency.

The first five categories mentioned above are self-explanatory, however, the last three categories are not often quoted, please allow me to explain briefly:

1. Stage of development: Human beings' fundamental right to life exists as much for a newborn (early stage of development) as for a 35year old mature adult. The same applies for a fetus in very early stage of development.

- 2. Environment: Human beings' fundamental rights applies as much to members of an undiscovered tribe in the Amazon jungle as for someone living in a penthouse apartment in Dublin 2. The same applies to human beings in the environment of their mothers' womb.
- 3. Dependency: Whether a bed-ridden individual dependent on caring relatives, a breastfed baby dependent on mother's milk or a fetus fully dependent on mother's womb, all human rights apply equally to each individual person.

The one fundamental question that you as a member or the Citizen's Assembly are called on to decide is:

WHAT IS THE UNBORN?

Scientists (embryologists, obstetricians), philosophers and Christian theologians are all in agreement: Human life begins at conception. Sadly, life often involves waiting and missed opportunities.

Many have to wait for months or a year if they fail an exam.

Many lose time and opportunities through injury or illness.

Rape.

Rape is awful.

Legal penalties for rapists should be more severe to reflect the brutality of the crime.

Efforts to ease the difficulties of giving evidence in rape trials should continue.

Despite the awfulness of rape allowing for legal abortions in the case of rape is not a humane solution to the problem. "Two wrongs don't make a right." Indeed, given the time it takes to secure rape convictions, is it a practical suggestion?

A woman who becomes pregnant following what she considers to be rape should be given official support to bring her baby to term.

After birth the mother should have a veto on the parenting of the child.

The father of a child conceived by rape should be legally prohibited from any decisions concerning the child. Inheritance liabilities should apply.

Allowing abortion in the case of rape would doom the unborn baby to a death sentence.

Conclusion.

Since 1983, with vast improvements in technology, we know without doubt that the unborn child is, from the very beginning, a unique and irreplaceable human being, differing from the rest of us only in size and location. Our improved knowledge of the development of the unborn baby is well documented with new discoveries are being made constantly and I'm sure you have received submissions to this effect from many people qualified in this area. It would seem logical therefore that in Ireland today our respect for the dignity of each unborn baby's life would have increased accordingly, but instead we are discussing removing that right in certain circumstances. You have been tasked with discussing my health and well being. You have the opportunity to recommend the type and quality of health care that is provided to me and every woman in this country. Your duty is to consider the needs of every woman in this country - and that includes the 12 woman who leave Ireland today to get an abortion. And the 12 will that will leave tomorrow, and the next day, and the next, and every day until the 8th amendment is repealed. So many problems arise from the 8th amendment, it can be hard to know where to start, so let me explain my own limited experience of it's effects. I am pregnant at the moment, after suffering a miscarriage earlier this year. I suffered for weeks at that time because I was not afforded any choice or treatment while I miscarried. But for the 8th amendment, I could have chosen to take medication on the day I found out that my pregnancy had not continued. I could have chosen to go through this harrowing experience at a time of my choosing, in the comfort of my own home, with my loving partner beside me. Instead I bled every day, for nearly three weeks, exhausted, unable to move from the couch every evening. Going to work everyday wondering when and where I'd be when it

happened? what would happen? what would it be like? would I get to the bathroom on time? As it turned out it happened on my last day of school, on a school trip in another county, where I spent the day bent double at the back of the bus trying to hide the crippling agony that came out of nowhere that day. I eventually made it home where I spent the night on the bathroom floor - three weeks after hearing the bad news. Instead of going through this trauma in my own time, at my own pace, with medical treatment, I was left at the mercy of nature for no other reason than the 8th amendment and it's required medical practices. I am now happily 11 weeks pregnant again. Yet the 8th amendment hangs over my head every minute, if I get sick, if something is wrong with my baby, if my labour does not go to plan I can do nothing, I have no voice, no choice in my medical care - because of the 8th amendment. And I want this baby. Pregnancy is hard. It is physically and emotionally draining, it is scary and I can only imagine the torture an unwanted pregnancy might feel like. I am willing to go through this hardship because I want a baby. The idea of being forced to go through this, being forced to become a parent is unimaginable to me. Members of the Citizen's Assembly,

The Citizens' Assembly has been asked to consider a referendum to repeal the right to life of the unborn child as protected under the 8th amendment to the Constitution. As an Irish citizen who strongly believes in the value of every human life, this prospect causes me great concern.

The 8th amendment guarantees the equal right to life of both women and their unborn children. The 8th was approved by the people in 1983 and, since that time, has saved an estimated 250,000 lives because our abortion rate has remained much lower than that of countries with legalised abortion. In Britain for example, one in every five babies is killed by abortion. In Ireland that figure is one in every twenty. If we had Britain's abortion rate we would see 10,000 more abortions every year – or 30 more every day. No reasonable person would welcome more abortions.

The 8th amendment is a piece of legislation that ensures the protection of the most basic human rights. Science tells us that preborn babies are human beings and deserving of the protection of society. At 21 days gestation, our hearts are already beating. Every abortion ends a human life.

The 8th amendment protects the lives of pregnant women and allows our doctors to provide all necessary life-saving care to women experiencing medical emergencies during pregnancy. In fact, as top medical experts testified to the Oireachtas in 2013, no woman has ever died in Ireland because of our pro-life laws. Our maternal mortality rate remains one of the lowest in the world.

Abortion also hurts women. A 2008 study (Fergusson et al) found that post-abortive women are 30% more likely to experience serious mental health problems while a 2006 study (Gissler et al) found that the suicide rate for post-abortive women was six times higher than women who had given birth.

Abortion not only has negative effects on women, but it is also a cruel and inhumane practice towards the unborn. These children are dismembered and removed piece by piece or given a lethal injection directly into their hearts. This practice is both medieval and barbaric.

Because of our law, the equal right to life of babies with disabilities and severe life limiting conditions are guaranteed the same protections as every other child. While abortion activists treat these children as if they were already dead, the fact is that most babies, even the most severe cases, live after birth and their families find their time together enormously healing. Parents of these babies recognize their children's lives as precious and say that improved perinatal hospice care, not abortion, is what they need.

Ireland has a proud history of standing up in defence of human rights and the 8th amendment is a testament to that. I urge you to consider this carefully and to remember that societies are judged on how they treat their most vulnerable members.

We would like to send our best wishes to the Citizens Assembly and hope its deliberations are reflective of the feelings of the whole nation. Unite Submission to the Citizens' Assembly in respect of the Eighth Amendment to the Constitution

The right to choose is a trade union issue

Unite welcomes the opportunity to make this Submission to the Citizens' Assembly. We are available to make an oral presentation to the Assembly reflecting the particular perspective of women workers, and of many Unite members, on this issue.

With over 1.4 million members in Great Britain and Ireland, and over 35,000 members, 10,000 of whom are women, in the Republic of Ireland, Unite is a strong voice for workers' rights and equality. Our pro-choice stance goes back many years, and was most recently affirmed at the union's 2010 Policy Conference. In 2015, at its Irish Policy Conference, the union adopted a motion calling for decriminalisation of abortion in line with international human rights standards through the island of Ireland – a move which would necessarily entail repeal of the Eighth Amendment in the Republic.

In 1983, the Irish Congress of Trade Unions opposed the 8th Amendment stating that "the rigidity and inflexibility of constitutional directives on social and moral issues was inappropriate in a democracy". The ICTU has recently reaffirmed this position.

Unite maintains that reproductive rights have transformed the working lives of women and allowed immeasurable educational and social benefits. This makes the right to choose a clear trade union issue.

Below we highlight some of the issues of particular concern to women workers and to Unite members:

Eighth Amendment inherently discriminatory against women

Although termination of pregnancy is theoretically lawful in the Republic within the parameters of the Eighth Amendment and the 2013 Protection of Life During Pregnancy Act, in practice these parameters are so restrictive as to render abortion inaccessible and to jeopardise women's health and lives. From Sheila Hodgers via Savita Halappanavar to 'Miss Y', women have lost their lives as a result of the equal status granted to a foetus under the Eighth Amendment.

It is Unite's position that women should not lose bodily autonomy during pregnancy and/or childbirth. They should not feel at risk during their pregnancy and all decisions relating to their person should be made by themselves. They should receive support to make their own decision regarding their sexual and reproductive health and to manage their own fertility, with healthcare professionals providing non-judgemental advice and care. Medical professionals providing such advice and care should be able to do so without fear of criminal sanction.

Last year over 3,400 women were forced to travel to Britain to access a termination. Other women — those who are financially or physically unable to travel, or who lack the necessary documentation — are forced to carry a pregnancy to term regardless of the consequences for their physical and mental health and wellbeing.

In Unite's view these restrictions are discriminatory and mean that the rights of pregnant women are uniquely restricted as opposed to the rights of men and of non-pregnant women when it comes to accessing appropriate healthcare.

Implications for low-income women

At a time when the Republic is facing a low pay crisis, women are disproportionately likely to be low-paid and/or in precarious work.

Low-paid women workers, those dependent on Social Protection, or women in relationships where they do not enjoy financial autonomy are at a particular disadvantage since the cost of procuring a termination outside the jurisdiction may be prohibitive. According to the Irish Family Planning Association, the cost of an abortion depends on the gestation and the procedure carried out (medical or surgical), and can range from €400 to €1,800. This excludes travel and accommodation costs, including the costs of procuring travel documentation.

In addition, many women needing to travel for a termination face childcare issues which may be both practically and financially insurmountable.

Many women are forced to access essential savings, take out a credit union loan or even have recourse to moneylenders in order to fund a termination. The result may be simply to further impoverish low-income families and their children. For many others, access to what Unite regards as an essential healthcare procedure is simply beyond their financial reach.

Workplace issues

In a situation where access to abortion is largely unavailable in the jurisdiction, and a termination is not viewed as a normal healthcare procedure, women workers are faced with a range of workplace issues which, in practical terms, further restrict their access to a termination and to essential postabortion healthcare.

At the most basic level, women may be unable to obtain leave of absence at short notice and without explaining the situation to their line manager.

Upon return, women may find it difficult to take the time necessary for post-abortion check-ups, or to take time of work for any health or wellbeing issues connected with the abortion.

Ongoing harassment of advice centre staff and users

Access to sexual and reproductive health services is crucial to women's health and well-being. It is also an international requirement under the 1981 Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women. Yet pregnancy advice centre workers, and those trying to access independent advice and support, often face intimidation and stigma. In addition, there is an ongoing issue with so-called 'rogue' pregnancy advice agencies which provide unfounded, misleading and

sometimes dangerous information to women facing crisis pregnancies in an attempt to dissuade them from seeking a termination.

In this regard, Unite welcomes the recent Government decision not to oppose legislation designed to regulate crisis pregnancy agencies.

Conclusion

It is increasingly clear that public opinion is ahead of public policy on this issue: according to the most recent opinion poll (Irish Times IPSOS/MRBI, 7 October 2016), 74 per cent of respondents support repeal of the Eighth Amendment.

Unite therefore advocates the holding of a referendum to Repeal the Eighth Amendment in its entirety as a necessary prelude to legislation providing for free, safe and legal abortion in Ireland.

In pursuit of this objective Unite has affiliated to the Abortion Rights Campaign, the Coalition to Repeal the Eighth Amendment and the Trade Union Campaign to Repeal the Eighth Amendment, which includes the Irish Congress of Trade Unions as well as individual unions.

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1. Reproductive Rights

1.1. The 8th Amendment

The Green Party supports the holding of a referendum to allow the people of Ireland determine whether or not the 8th Amendment should be repealed.

The Green Party will support a vote in favour of repeal in the above proposed referendum on the 8th amendment, on the condition that the Government have provided draft legislation which will be put in place if the referendum passes.

This would bring us in line with the recommendations of the UN special rapporteur on the right to health on their visit to Ireland. This will also bring us in line with International Law regarding reproductive justice.

1.2. Legislation

That upon the repeal of the 8th amendment the Green Party will advocate legislation allowing for the lawful termination of pregnancies in cases of

- fatal foetal abnormality
- rape
- incest
- endangerment to the health/life of the mother

The Green Party understands that abortion is always a last resort option. In keeping with this, we propose that there would also be provision of unbiased sex and relationship education, free gynaecological care for under 18s, and access to safe and affordable contraceptives.

The Green Party also recognises as part of reproductive justice that more provision must be made for women who choose to continue their pregnancies. We propose expanded maternity and parental leave and that there will be expanded programs of post-natal care, particularly regarding post-natal depression. Furthermore, the Green Party believes that more support can be provided for pregnant women at a community level through community midwives and local health centres. The Green Party also supports choice in maternity care, and would legislate for expanded choice in birthing, such as home births, where they are deemed safe.

The Green Party proposes to expand unbiased state counselling and advice services for pregnant women.

1.2.1. An Outline of How Legislation Would be Developed

The Green Party understands that the health and safety of patients is the concern of medical practitioners, who have a professional duty and ethical code that society and government can respect, along with the patient and family involved. Therefore, in terms of imposing time limits and definitions of risk and any other limits on the above circumstances, the Green Party will defer that

decision to an expert medical group in line with current structures within the medical profession, which will be convened before any legislation is written.

1.2.2. An Outline of Proposed Legislation

Basic Pre-requisites for a lawful termination

The abortion is performed at an authorised location.

Two registered medical practitioners are of the opinion, formed in good faith, that one of the below criteria is met

Fatal Foetal Abnormality

Under our proposal, an abortion may be performed if the foetus suffers from such anomaly or injury that

- it is unlikely to be born alive; or
- it is likely to die during birth; or
- it is unlikely to be capable of sustaining independent life after birth.

Rape/Incest

Given the severity of the crimes of rape and incest as well as the time-consuming nature of bringing about a conviction for these crimes, the Green Party believes that women who have been victims of these crimes should be able to legally access termination of a pregnancy which comes about as a result of these crimes.

Endangerment to the health/life of the mother

An abortion may be performed under this condition if:

- In forming their opinions, both registered medical practitioners have taken account of the
 pregnant woman's assessment of the potential risk to her life, which includes the risk of
 suicide.
- In forming their opinions, both registered medical practitioners have taken account of the pregnant woman's views on the impact of the continuance of the pregnancy on her physical and/or mental health.
- Both registered medical practitioners are of the opinion, formed in good faith, that the continuance of the pregnancy would entail a risk to the pregnant woman's physical and/or mental health.

In relation to risk assessment:

• The risk to health need not originate with the pregnancy. It can also refer to an Independent condition, whether new, pre-existing or recurring, or to a combination of conditions.

Reproductive Rights Policy

- The risk may already have materialised at the time of assessment, or may be expected to materialise in the future.
- The medical practitioners do not have to be satisfied that the abortion will completely eliminate the risk to the pregnant woman's health.
- The medical practitioners are required to make a holistic assessment of the pregnant woman's circumstances in their full context.

1.3. Decriminalization

The Green Party would not prosecute women who obtain abortions, however, we recognize the harms of "back-alley" or unregulated abortions, and so it would remain an offence to perform an unregulated abortion or to cause a woman to miscarry through assault.

1.4. Refusal of Care on Grounds of Conscience

Provide that:

- (1) Medical professionals, or other health care practitioners under their supervision, may refuse to participate in an abortion on the basis of a good faith conscientious objection, except where the abortion is immediately necessary to save the pregnant woman's life or to prevent severe or disabling damage to her health.
- (2) A person who has a conscientious objection shall without delay (i) inform the pregnant woman of the refusal of care in writing (ii) inform her of her right to see an alternative medical practitioner, nurse or midwife and (iii) make such arrangements for the transfer of her care as are necessary to enable her to access an abortion in a timely manner.
- (3) Health care institutions may not invoke a right to conscientious objection.
- (4) The Minister for Health retains the responsibility of ensuring that a safe and timely service is maintained for patients when accommodating conscientious objectors.
- (5) In any legal proceedings arising from this, the burden of proof of conscientious objection shall rest on the person claiming to rely on it.

1.4.1. Establishment of an appeals process on refusal of a lawful termination

We would set up an independent review body to review cases where women are refused a lawful termination under this policy. The members of this review body shall be appointed through the public appointments process.

1.4.2. Application for Review

Where a registered medical practitioner is of the opinion that a pregnant woman is not entitled to undergo an abortion under this policy, he or she shall immediately

- (1) inform her of that refusal, providing written confirmation within 24 hours;
- (2) inform her of her right to make an application to the review body; and
- (3) inform her of her right to seek a second opinion. If the pregnant woman prefers to seek a second opinion, the registered medical practitioner shall refer her to an alternative practitioner without delay.

Matters to be considered

- 1) Is abortion the best option?
- The consequences of abortion must be borne in mind.
- 3) Such consequences are: depression, remorse, feelings of guilt, health problems possibly life long thereafter, deprivation of holding one's baby for however short a time. Possible inability to bear any further children. May not be able to form long term relationship(s) marriage; may have to carry a secret, from certain friends, for life, may not be able to concentrate on long term employment.
- 4) The abortion process is very cold hearted, in to and out from a clinic, no hospice treatment whatsoever, women should not be put through such a traumatic process.
- 5) The 2013 act: Protection of life in Pregnancy, has not addressed all the issues, has not been satisfactory, it was very much a reactionary act, to matters at that time, Knee – Jerk law is gererally bad law..

- 6) Yes of course it is realised that women do suffer Crisis Pregnancy, but in a crisis, women need support moral, medical, family support.

- 12) Medical practitioners should afford girls/women, in a crisis pregnancy situation, who may even be feeling suicidal, whose life may be at risk, the full facility of having their baby, in a proper hospice environment.

13) Fatal foetal abnormalities (f f a) is a term which is being used very loosely, and it is thought carelessly, by the Pro—Choice advocates. The ff a term is not a recognised medical term. Of course any woman carrying a foetus with serious medical conditions, is in a crisis situation, that is when proper medical care is necessary-essential.

Conclusion - Recommedation.

- 14) It is recommended that what is necessary is Medical Practioners Act or Amendment Act, to enable practitioners to carry out the best possible clinical process on a girl/woman in a crisis pregnancy situation, so that she can have her baby, in a proper warm – hearted environment.
- 15) The baby may have serious ailments, may or may not live a long time.
- 16) In such a situation the baby would have or have had a life, thereby ensuring the Right to Life.

Nothing further occurs on this serious matter at present, if anything further occurs, a further submission will be made.

SUBMISSION TO THE CITIZENS' ASSEMBLY

Dear Members of the Citizens' Assembly,

One of the most crucial issues that the Citizens' Assembly has been asked to consider is that of a potential referendum to repeal the 8th amendment of the Constitution.

The 8th amendment guarantees the equal right to life of both women and their unborn children. The 8th was approved by the people in 1983 and, since that time, has saved more than 250,000 lives. 250,000 lrish people are alive today because our pro-life laws recognize the worth and dignity of every human person.

Because of our law, all citizens are given an equal – it does not allow our society to discriminate against children because of disabilities, or gender, or size, or just because they are considered "unwanted". The 8th protects the most basic human right - the right to life - of these children and their mothers.

The 8th amendment allows our doctors to provide all necessary life-saving treatment to women experiencing medical emergencies during pregnancy. In fact, no woman has ever died in Ireland because of our pro-life laws. Our maternal mortality rate remains one of the lowest in the world.





SUBMISSION ON REPEAL OF THE EIGHTH AMENDMENT TO THE IRISH CONSTITUTION

Everybody nowadays knows about DNA. When a man and a woman produce a new member of the human family at conception the fertilised egg contains the DNA of a unique new individual. It is, as any viewer of crime and detection stories knows, unique for the length of the life of that new life, and is used as an identifier of such. To try to refer to it as "just a blob of Jelly", "just a bundle of cells" or other demeaning terms is to miss the way that biology works in human reproduction. This ploy is also intended to cover arguments to allow the termination – in this case not just ending the growth of, but the killing of, the new member of our species.

Of course the new life will, if allowed, and with the guidance of his/her own DNA, go through the growth and development stages we recognise using terms we gave these stages for our convenience in Biology, Medical science and Sociology such as Zygote, Embryo, Foetus, Prenatal stage, Baby, Infant, Toddler, etc. up through Teens Young Adults, Adult, Elderly and so on. To none of these can we logically or biologically say "You are not a Human, not Human yet, not a Human because of a disability, no longer Human since your accident, no longer Human because you are too old". We have made those mistakes referring to race, colour, gender, religion, stranger, any difference, before. Do we really want to go back and retrace these old, old, and costly mistakes with all the killing, suffering and damage to our human societies that they brought.

More recently other countries and indeed elements of our own media and politicians have become more critical of Ireland and Irish law castigating us as 'less progressive', 'ultra conservative' and even 'barbarous' in our laws and attitudes on the whole issue of prenatal care and abortion availability. Why? Because we will not allow the deliberate destruction of our offspring before they are born. Countries such as Canada, the USA, Denmark, the UK to name a few, and those of our own political parties whose policies support abortion by mothers choice up to birth. Canada's official rules for its hospitals and clinics that carry out abortions are that any child surviving such be left unfed and uncared for until he/she dies.

The number of such cases must be recorded and placed in public record. The number is in the hundreds yearly. In the UK the official figures are that 90% of all prenatal diagnosed Downs Syndrome humans are 'terminated'. This is likely to increase with recent more efficient and free diagnoses. In Denmark the figure is 98%, and Denmark's government policy is to have the country 100% Downs free by 2030. In the USA some clinics sell the body parts of aborted babies by techniques that prevent damage to the more 'valuable' and saleable organs. Some of Planned Parenthood clinics already federally funded yearly to the tune of some ¾ Billion is one example. Likewise partial birth abortions are legal in some states. There are indeed very few countries worldwide where some form of abortion is not allowed by Law. Even here in Ireland the push to extend the practise to the final goal of legal abortion in any or all circumstances is already continuous and relentless. Which of the above named, self proclaimed, civilised and progressive societies, are we to emulate. They want us to Repeal the Eighth Amendment. If this is a necessity to join the ranks of progressive democracies we must say 'No Thanks' and retain our own constitutional protection of our unborn children.




