Working with the under 24 population in Wheatfield Prison, Mountjoy Progression Unit and Oberstown Detention Centre

Young adults aged 18-24 are disproportionately represented in the prison population: 20% of prison population compared with 9% of general population;





What's Working Well

- Young adults are more amenable to rehabilitation and change than older adults who commit the same crimes.
- The brain and maturity continue to develop beyond adolescence and into one's mid-twenties – the right interventions can support desistance
- Interventions and good practice that have proven successful in the youth justice system could be extended to young adults aged 18-24



What's Not Working Well

- The Drugs gangs are growing in influence over young people in disadvantaged communities.
- In some parts of the cities daily drug use or sale and supply is normal behaviour.
- We are simply not going to scare young people into not taking drugs.
- We are not going to arrest our way to removing drugs from our streets.
- Even those in prison for other charges are often still drug related.
- The stigma and the possible criminal convictions prevent people seeking support.



Meet Conor

- 21 years of age
- Daily cannabis smoker
- 12 simple possession charges
- 1 sale and supply charge
- Has completed community service,
- Has served 5 days in prison,
- Has paid fines
- Even went to rehab for 8 days .
- He still smokes.
- He still functions.
- He buys from criminal gangs.
- He unintentionally funds the drugs wars.
- He struggles to build a career, as he has a significant criminal record.
- He feels excluded from his community.
- He feels hounded by the Gardai



What do we need to do differently?

- Not have young people growing up experiencing exclusion due to drug use.
- Connect the 18-year-old boy in the court for simple possession to wider societal inequalities.
- Promote education, harm reduction and safe alternatives.
- Have programmes in the prisons engaging with young people caught up in the drugs trade to explore viable exit strategies.
- Remove drug charges from criminal proceedings, fund addiction interventions.
