

How do we measure drug use in the population?



National Drug and Alcohol Survey

~6,000 adults (15+) every 4 years since 2002



European School Project on Alcohol and Drugs (ESPAD)

~1,900 15–16-year-olds every 4 years since 1999

Health Behaviour in School-Children (HBSC)

~10,000 2ND Level schoolchildren 11–18-year-olds since 1998



European Web Survey on Drugs 2021

~5,800 adults (18+) who had used drugs in the last year











Last year substance use – (15-64 years)






What drugs do Irish people use?

In 2019 **9**% or **287,000 people** used an illegal drug in the previous year. The most commonly used drugs were:






Ecstasy 2.7% (1.1% in 2002)






How does Ireland compare to other European countries?










Trends in polydrug use

Types of cannabis used in Ireland



96% used cannabis herb



47% used cannabis edibles



23% used cannabis oil/extract



20% used cannabis resin



Cannabis use disorder



1.4% (or 45,000) of the Irish population have cannabis use disorder (cannabis abuse or dependence)



Most common among males aged 15–34 years



Of those who had used cannabis in the past year, 1 in 5 met the criteria for Cannabis Use Disorder



Drug use – sex and age differences





Drug use – age and sex differences



Males more likely than females to use drugs

12% Males

6%

Females


Gap much closer in 15-24-year-olds (21% vs 16%)



Drug use – age and sex differences

15–24 year olds most likely to use drugs (19%)

Drug use remains high among males aged 25–34 years (26%) but tails off for females (8%)







Age of initiation

Delay in age of starting drug use





Why age matters?



If start drinking alcohol at 15 years or earlier,

4 times more likely

to develop alcohol use disorder than someone who starts at 19 or later



Early cannabis use a predictor for cannabis use disorder



Earlier alcohol and cannabis use a predictor of future cocaine use




Percentage of people who use drugs, by area

Drug use higher among students and unemployed

Home duties 3%




Drug use across society

- Education

Similar levels of drug use in most and least deprived areas






Cannabis use in schoolchildren by social class

Cannabis use by schoolchildren not affected by social class

Social class determined by **parent's job**






Socioeconomic status and cannabis use disorder

Cannabis use common across all socioeconomic groups but...

....problem cannabis use such as cannabis use disorder (CUD) higher among individuals with lower education levels



Impact of drug use on communities

Impact of drug use greater in areas of deprivation





Key Messages

- 9% of people in Ireland use drugs
- Cannabis, ecstasy and cocaine most commonly used drugs
- Young people & males more likely to use drugs
- Gap between 15–24-year-old males and females drug use is narrow
- Polydrug use common
- Socioeconomic status does not impact drug use...but ...does differ in impact felt in communities
